

Global Political Economy: Introduction to the course

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Aim of the course

The course is aimed at providing an <u>overview</u> of <u>economic issues</u> related to global economy by combining concepts of <u>international economics</u> and international <u>business</u>

A combination of <u>standard economic models</u> and <u>empirical evidence</u> (based on historical data or case studies) is employed to <u>understand</u> what drives international <u>trade</u> between countries and <u>foreign direct investments</u> of multinational firms as well as to discuss which are the <u>consequences</u> of globalization on socioeconomic dimensions




